- ~300 acres in Conservation Restriction (CR) easements held by GLT
 - Some public, some private

Trail Crews: Field Roles

In conjunction with GLT board members:

- Saw crews
 - Be safe
- Scouts
 - General conditions, look for missing signs
- Trail Stewards
 - Organizing & communicating with other volunteers on same property:
 - Scouting for maintenance issues e.g., request chainsaw crews
 - Anyone can reports findings using Trail Forks, trail steward gets notice

<u>New for 2019:</u>

- Bridge construction & mud control
- Signs & Navigation
- Property Monitoring
 - Monitor property boundaries for encroachment using phone app or GPS

EASY WALK: if you have a 3-7 year old and you have already visited the story book trail and the Gummere Wood trail, this walk is for you! Go to the parking area on Meadow Lane (off of Wheeler Rd) that leads to the Land Trust's Brigham Hill Wildlife Area. This property is flat and has wide trails on 46 acres. It also abuts the Pike, with a big chain link fence along the boundary, so you can watch the trucks and cars zoom by. A great combo for busy little bodies: running around in the forest and watching trucks and cars - check it out! (NOTE: many of our trails are now mapped in free Hiking Apps like Komoot, for both iPhone and Android)

Many Forms of "Taking Care of a Property"

- Trail maintenance
 - Downed tree removal
 - Mud season signs
 - Leaf blowing/raking (dries trails faster)
- Trail navigation improvements (signs, maps)
- Trail construction (bridges, mud control, new trails)
 - Often requires wetlands permits from town Conservation Commission

Land Stewardship too, for example:

- Property monitoring (encroachments, invasives, dumping, etc.)
- Land Use policies: Forestry and Agriculture Plans, etc.
- Legal protections for any eventuality, such as CRs on owned property

+300 acres of Conservation Restrictions

GLT holds "Conservation Restriction" easements on 8 properties to protect open space, but DOES NOT OWN the CR properties:

- Williams CR (Williams')
- Williams Woods CR (Williams')
- Webber CR (ToG)
- Pell CR (ToG) the Christmas Tree Farm
- Mazza CR (ToG)
- D Williams CR (D. Williams)
- English CR (English)
- Pond CR (The Ponds)
- GLT monitors these annually per the easement rules
- In exchange for public open space, owner gets a tax abatement
- Owner maintains property we can offer help, but first need to ask

 - For property boundaries, not really for trails
- 2. Major Signage at trailheads, forks
 - Includes Property Names, trail names, possibly URLs
 - QR code to bring up online trail maps try it!
 - Sample Android App: QR Code Reader
- 3. Blazes
