NEW LAND ACQUISITION:

Grafton Land Trust worked with Wheelrock Development LLC at 21 Wheeler Rd. to conserve the open space just to the south of the development. Instead of becoming private land with a building restriction, the land was converted into a separate 4.11 acre parcel and donated as open space per the Planning Board requirements for the development. Grafton Land Trust agreed to hold, manage, and conserve the property for conservation and public benefit. This 4.11 acre meadowland abuts

Yes, we in fact do own an island, and it's called Fletcher Reserve. It is a 1.75 acre island and consists of upland mixed deciduous forest. An intermittent stream called George Brook, in the deed, enters the parcel from the east and splits into two tributaries, both emptying into Silver Lake. The island

Hillside Meadows Equestrian Team...who did some heavy

rises 15 to 20 feet above the lake and consists entirely of a mature pine forest. The forest floor is wide open and is covered in most places by a deep layer of pine needles. It is accessible by water and has a natural landing for canoes, kayaks, or other small boats on its southwestern shore. Fletcher Island is the only Grafton Land Trust property that features swimming. The property was dedicated to the memory of Helen Fletcher, a former naturalist and a Grafton Forest Association (a previous name for GLT) member and was named the Fletcher Reserve. It was acquired in 1970.

MORE ACRES PRESERVED !

The conservation restriction for the Great Meadow Gateway property was signed by MA State EEA Secretary Theoharides, after the Select Board and Land Trust officers signed it the week prior. On August 27, 2020, Grafton Land Trust registered the fully executed conservation restriction (an easement) at the Worcester County Registry of Deeds. It is now in Deed Book 63117 at Page 205. GLT has a responsibility to monitor the property and enforce its conservation into the future. This is a permanent conservation easement on 5.3 acres of trails and open space that are part of the town's Great Meadow Conservation Area in the Merriam District.

VINE CLEANUP:

we've removed bittersweet vine from the old apple orchard area of the Jeanne Johnson Preserve located at 34 Brown's Road. This is part of a state-approved forestry plan to give the native trees and plants room to thrive. The machine in the pictures is called a forest mulcher. It can turn brush and vines up to 8" diameter into mulch. We will need to plant in a season or two to prevent the seed bed of vine berries from sprouting and taking hold. (photos by Ken Holberger)

The Grafton Land Trust is a private, non-profit, member-supported organization that preserves, maintains, and advocates for open space in Grafton.

Company Overview

Founded in 1958, the Grafton Forest Association was established by residents of Grafton, Massachusetts who had the foresight to see the long term benefits of land conservation.

We are now known as the Grafton Land Trust (GLT for short), and we continue to work closely with landowners, federal, state, and local governments, and other conservation groups to both advocate for and directly preserve open space and natural ecosystems in Grafton, Mass. Six hundred and twenty acres are now directly protected, with another 300 acres protected with Conservation Restriction easements held by GLT. Despite this great accomplishment, we must all continue our work and ensure that precious land is preserved for future generations.

<u>Mission</u>

The MISSION of the Grafton Land Trust is to:

ACQUIRE and maintain open space in the town of Grafton.... INFORM landowners of conservation options for their properties. ADVOCATE for open space in all appropriate forums. WORK in partnership with town officials and others on conservation projects. CREATE and maintain trails on select properties for public use. HOST programs and events for public education and enjoyment. GRANT funds to local educators to assist in nature education. PARTICIPATE in local and regional planning efforts for open space. ACCEPT and hold conservation restrictions on private and public properties.
